CARLISLE — The Nicholas County Bluejackets ended last week with two wins in a double header against Pendleton County Saturday, without benefit of their strong senior players.

In the first game, Bradley Trussell pitched what fans described as a stand out game. But by the fourth inning, the game turned into a rail hit.

Jackets take doubleheader from Pendleton Saturday

DANVILLE — Continuing with the success of Nicholas County Friday, the Bluejackets took second place in the week long Danville tournament.

However, after their third round game Wednesday against Lexington Dasher, it was an uphill battle all the way to the finale.

Nine errors through the course of six innings dealt Nicholas a Wednesday morning as they paired off against a tough Lexington Dasher high school team.

At 11:30 a.m., Pitcher Travis Sims (0-1) kicked off the jacket effort on the mound. The early game, however, went against the Jackets as Dasher scored three runs at the top of the first.

The Lexington team continued to dominate the game as errors prevented the Jackets from showing up a good defensive effort.

By the middle of the fifth inning, Nicholas was in a two-run hole. Dasher had posted a 6-0 lead.

Jackets rally led to a win as Travis Sims knocked in a home run to cut off a two hit game and sent the Jackets on a possible rally. But despite a four runs in the last inning, time ran out for the Jackets as they fell 4-3, their first loss of the season.

Kevins Morris pulled in two hits, along with Israel Stacy and Bradley Trussell, with two hits apiece.

Nicholas vs. Corbin

Wednesday afternoon the Bluejackets pulled themselves together to take a blistering 15-0 win over Corbin in the latter half of a double header in the Danville tournament.

Tied at 3-3 by the middle of the third inning, the Jackets hammered in three runs to move to a 6-3 lead.


However, Corbin came back at the top of the fourth with a starting five run to take a two run, 8-6, lead.

Time was running against the Jackets as they came out for their third and last at bat at the bottom of the fourth. Led by home runs from Sims, the Jackets rallied for six runs.

Pendleton scores, but they needed one more run to keep the game from running into extra innings. Daniel Brown brought the Jackets back to level ground on a single from Bradley Trussell. The Jackets took the 4-4 tie.

Capps makes decision to join Army National Guards

CARLISLE — For a great many high school juniors and seniors, with the approach of May comes the time when students need to get thinking seriously about their future.

For many, the future, in general, sounds easy. Go to college, get a job, make money. Meanwhile, those of us who are older and know what is like outside high school doors just shake our heads, knowing life just isn't that easy.

However, there are some kids who are wise enough to know they don't know anything. There are students who may have the mental capacity to make the jump from high school to college, but one sim-

pie thing keeps them from realizing their dreams — money.

For Nicholas County senior Jimmy Wayne Capps, money wasn't an obstacle. If he had chosen to go straight from high school to Morehead State University, his parents were capable of seeing him through.

But on March 5, Capps made the decision to enter the Army National Guard. It was a decision he had wrestled with since he was 15 years old and the burden of the question "What am I going to do with my life?" weighed full down upon him.

His father, Wayne Capps, a guardman for well over 20 years, left the decision to his son. But he made certain,

Capps said, that his son knew he had options to consider.

"I guess it helped me that I had already had some connection with the Carlisle Army. But when it came to making the decision, I'll tell you, it wasn't easy," Capps said.

"What ultimately did it was that I didn't think I had the personal discipline to shoot right on into college. The financial benefits are good. I can't say they didn't play a factor in my decision, but I really think the guard will get me to mature and become an adult so when I do go into college, I won't go in with the wrong attitude," Capps said.

But for others, college may not be life's answer. Capps admits he feels very strongly about his involvement with the Guard and if his commitment now transfers to a future career he would be more than happy with it.

"I plan on getting my degree. I'm interested in computer technology and programming and, though the guard can give me crucial experience in the area, I believe I need the college level experience," Capps said.

But the guard can provide other graduating seniors with a life, an alternative, Capps said. That alternative is appealing. If accepted into the program, it can provide a great living, especially for a family just trying to get on its feet.

The first year annual salary for a guardman, for only part time work, is \$3,050. On top of that is an enlistment bonus of \$2,000.

For college bound students, the army GI bill can provide students with an average of \$170 a month for a two-
