

Test show high chemical levels in school sewer line

CARLISLE — Sewer line tests run by state supervisors and by city sewer plant supervisor Gene Kelley show the plant is operating very well. Water released by the plant after treatment is nearly as clean as drinking water, Kelley said.

However when tests were run on sewer lines at the Nicholas County school campus and Jockey International, Kelley said they revealed abnormally high levels of substances coming into the plant for processing which are beyond acceptable state Environmental Protection standards.

The least serious of these is cooking grease from the nearby Jockey International plant, he said. Grease in the sewer pipes tends to build up very quickly and can foul up the system if levels are too high.

Kelley said he had informed the plant of the prob-

lem and workers have had to clear the Jockey sewer line of grease before. However, Kelley said, the more serious problem was with sewer lines coming from the school.

According to Kelley, both his tests and state tests, done after treatment in nearby Jockey, show that the water is clean as drinking water, Kelley said.

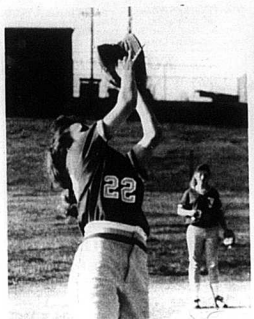

This meeting shall be held not less than five (5) school days nor more than ten (10) school days from the 21, 1992 and 2000. Principals receipt of petition.

- to acknowledge the receipt of the required notification from the superintendent to attend that the following limited contracts are renewed for school year 1992-93.
- to acknowledge the receipt of the required notification from the Superintendent that the following certified personnel are on continuing contract or tenure status for school year 1992-93.
- to approve application for the Nicholas County Schools "Hidden Dropout" Project in amount of \$30,983.00.
- This is a federal grant written by Charles Canupp so the school can receive money to help students, who are attending school physically but not mentally absorbing the material.
- to approve adoption of high school textbooks for language arts, health and art for the 1992-93 school year.
- to approve the following school and community requests:
 - The seventh grade students request a field trip. Seventh grade teachers.
 - Girls basketball team requests permission to participate in the Famous Recipe Classic tournament in Northern Kentucky next January 13-16, 1993.
 - Nicholas County High School FHA Chapter request permission to hold a fund raiser project to benefit Audra Sparks Medical Fund. FHA Advisors.
 - The Nicholas County Band requests permission to travel to Kings Island, Ohio for the Kings Island Music Festival on April 25th and 26th.
