Dear Editor:

I received from Bob Johnson an issue of the Adams people lived in the small, family-based village of Adams. The Adams people lived in rock shelters, eating available animals and nuts.

When the plant and animal populations changed in the area, the Adams people invented new tools to exploit these resources. The atlatl, a spear-thrower, allowed the Adams people to hunt the smaller, swifter animals. Ground stone tools, such as axes and pestles, allowed these people to use the forest resources.

Also evident during the Archaic period is the growth of a social structure. Certain people in this part of the country are known as the Mississippian. Evidence for social ranking is found in the graves of the Archaic people.

The Woodland period dated 3,000 to 1,200 years ago. In large societies made up of related communities or villages, large, nucleated ceremonial centers, served as the social, political and economic centers for an area. These centers contained homes, burial mounds, and large-topped pyramidal mounds. Hunting

People made shell-tempered pottery and participated in a large trade network. Trade goods came into the ceremonial centers and were then distributed to other villages by the leader of the area.

Leadership was hereditary, meaning only members of the leading family held position and power. The leaders held the religious, political and economic power of the society.

The leaders and their families were buried in large, elaborate burial mounds. They were buried with objects and materials acquired through the trade network.

Some of the artifacts, certain graves lined with sandstone slabs, served the rest of the society.

A remnant of the Mississippian culture still existed in the southeastern United States when the Spaniards arrived. The intersection of Old and New World cultures destroyed the Mississippian society and people through disease and ignorance.
