 tank is equipped with a 10' Newton Johnson Pump. The pump is located in the area where there is no available water supply from creeks or hydrants in the area. That's about the entire county, Hughes said.

At this time, the new storage tank is just for storage. In a fire, the tank would flash its supply to the main fire truck's pumps. But, Hughes said, the department plans to set a fire water pump at the site as a

new tank in cases where one truck pump may not be enough. The truck, a 1985 GMC Brigadier Road Tractor, and water storage tank were purchased with state grants and fire rating activities.

The 1983 Ford Fire Truck, which has become increasingly difficult to maintain in the last few years, is becoming less roadworthy, Hughes said. With the new tank, the department will be less dependent on the old tank and will be assigned to minor fire runs.
