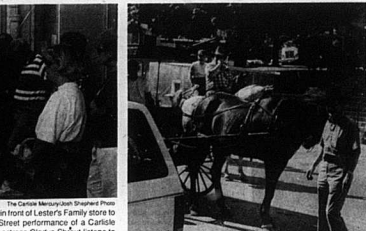
He was a retired farmer, a member of Stoney Creek Christian Church, and was born in Nicholas County to the late Philip and Louisa McClanahan Sugg.
