Mr. Coy was northbound on Coy 627, seven miles south of Paris, when his 1989 Ford traveled into the path of the southbound 1992 Chevrolet truck, which was hauling the 18-foot trailer, police said.

The driver of the truck, Tony B. Greene, 20, of Falmouth, seemed to avoid the car, but the car hit the trailer.

Mr. Coy, who was ejected from the car, received massive head injuries. Greene was not injured. No seat belts were in use, police said.
