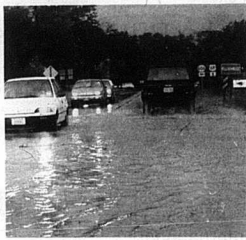


Sudden rainfall behind US 68 car wreck

The rainstorm that

the Elizaville area at about 7:15 p.m. Friday was confined to that specific area, therefore no official record was made of the amount of rain that fell. However, according to Elizaville resident Lucian Workman, who keeps a rain gauge at his home, an estimated 2.5 inches of rain fell in the Elizaville area in a 10-15 minute period. Water runoff from the hills surrounding produced creeks swollen with water. Sections of U.S. 68 were covered in deep water, slowing traffic and causing some damage to the area. Between houses, mid colored rain' water rushed down into the nearby creeks. As the sudden black storm moved away from the area, a call came in at about 7:40 p.m. for an officer to respond to a single vehicle accident on U.S. 68. State Trooper Tim Layne investigated the single vehicle injury accident which was located approximately 9 miles outside of Carlisle. The driver involved was Gene James, Jr., 20, of Paris, Kentucky. The 1986 Ford had apparently slid off the road during the rainstorm and crashed into the guard rail. The driver was uninjured.

Dunham, Kerry Logan and Dreama Griffith. The high school teachers: Al Gross III, English and Laura Thomas, Math. Bus Drivers: Faye Moles, Sue Igoyle, Mary Jo McCord, and Linda Stone. Cooks: Viola Sparks, Judy Turpin and Linda Tedder. Each cook will work two weeks a piece. The board accepted the offer of assistance from the school facility construction commission in the amount of \$9649. The board must respond by June 18, if it plans on accepting the money. Gilbert said the commission money can be bonded after January 1, 1993 and if bonded at the current rate it would be approximately \$110,000. Nicholas County qualified for the commission money last year in an odd year. Since this is an even year the school can have over 10 percent in the construction fund and not have to exercise in the even years. The board approved the fee for the renovation of the elementary school in the total amount of \$1,143,871.85. This is not the amount the school owes, but the total construction cost. At the present time Gilbert said the school owes approximately \$60,000. The balance of the construction will be paid after all the subcontractors are paid. Elder Construction is responsible for the measure of the construction until final payment and a year after the payment. The board approved the contract with Claffefter & Samak for architectural services for the track construction. This is a standard building Grounds One contract.

us an extra field for soccer" Clavear said. "The extra field would be good for the junior high to play or practice football." Gilbert said he would suggest this to Claffefter and Samak and see if this would be feasible to put the track in this area. Nicholas County Board member Sammie Vice said he had spoken to the Kentucky National Guard and the request the school made to move the dirt is still on its list. Vice said they are still willing to move the dirt at the school. The contract with A-1 Sanitation for garbage pick-up for 1992-93 school year beginning July 1, 1992 was approved by the board. A-1 Sanitation will pick the garbage up for \$22 a day during school everyday and twice a week when school is not in session. Browne Haller told Gilbert he would like to place a dumpster at each school. Haller said he would furnish the dumpsters, empty it each day and keep it clean. Nicholas County Board member David Smoot was concerned that the dumpsters would be placed too close to the school and could catch on fire if a cigarette possible placed too close. Gilbert said the school had been told by the health department they must keep the garbage in cans with lids. The garbage has been put in the screened in area, but the tied up bugs are not in garbage cans. The board authorized the superintendent to make a habitat program grant for the artist in residence. The school approved the following:

To acknowledge the receipt of the required notification regarding the resignation of the following: Ed Oakley, as teacher and coach, Bobby Starie, as teacher and coach and Jewell Khamel, as custodian at high school. To acknowledge the receipt of the required notification regarding the retirement of Waunita Reid, as elementary teacher. Gilbert said he would have Reid apply for the sick days she has left at 30 percent of her last year's salary. To acknowledge the receipt of the required notification regarding the resignation of the following: Wilma Clark Elementary Instructional Assistant I, Patricia Ockerman, as, Elementary School Secretary who replaces Brenda Day and Day replaced Dorothy Wesley who resigned, and Marilyn Flora, as elementary school food service assistant. II who will replace Giddigh who moved to the high school. To amend the April 13, 1992 regular board meeting minutes to list Dorothy Laycock as receiving a continuing contract. 1992-93 school tied up bugs are not in garbage cans. 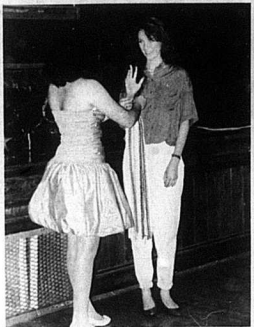

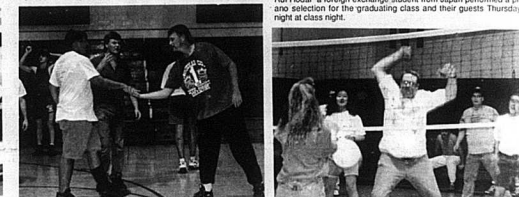

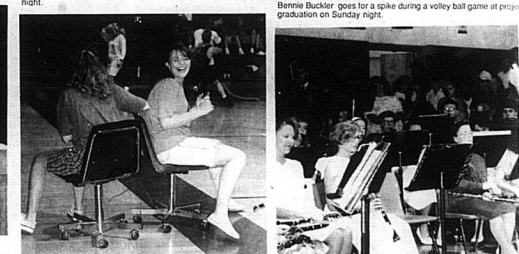

Brian Canupp shakes Nicholas County High School teacher and coach hand during a basketball game at project graduation Sunday night.



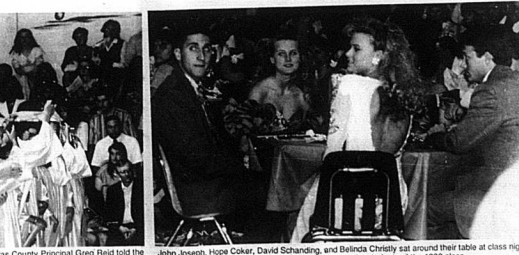
Quatie Tarouilly, a foreign exchange student from France, said her goodbyes to the class of 1992.
