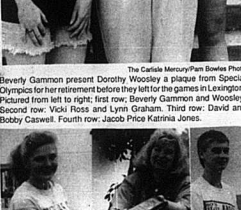

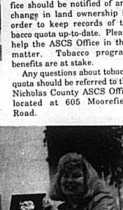
Farmers have to July 1 to lease quota

Nicholas County farmers have until July 1, 1992 to lease their 1992 quota. All transfers of tobacco quota must be signed by all owners of transferring farm and by operator of receiving farm. Producers should also remember that tobacco quotas must be grown or leased away two out of three years. Failure to comply with this rule will result in the loss of the tobacco quota from the farm permanently.

Tobacco quota owners wishing to sell their quotas must sign papers before July 1 in order to be effective for the 1992 crop year. Tobacco quota can be sold from one producer to another within Nicholas County. Buyers of quota must share in the risk of production for three years.

Nicholas County ASCS Office should be notified of any change in land ownership in order to keep records of tobacco quota up-to-date. Please help the ASCS Office in this matter. Tobacco program benefits at stake.

Magistrates discuss progress of new vote precincts

CARLSLE - News of the current re-districting of Nicholas County presented a number of problems for the county at the regular meeting of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court Tuesday evening.

During the course of the meeting, Magistrate Aamin Smith asked if since their approval of the re-districting last month, if the magistrates' responsibilities were to be directed toward the new districts to which they belong or the old districts from which they were elected.

According to Nicholas County Clerk Doug Fryman, Magistrate Floyd Bussell brought the subject up personally because, he said, the court promised to help with the purchase of a two-way radio for the county treasurer and secretary the radio cost an estimated \$500. Bussell was against covering the entire cost, but since the county election board began a previous meeting, said it would agree to help with the radio, he was agreeable to meeting half the cost.

However, some magistrates expressed some frustration, the precincts had been almost equal, he said. There is allowed only a 10 percent difference between the precincts, he said.

The problems this type of regulation has is immediately apparent since many of the new districts connect with the heavily populated area near downtown Carlsle. For example, Fryman pointed out District 2 under Magistrate

Daryl Stacy. One of the new precincts would take in a distance relatively close to the residents in the Blue Licks area to reach a voting booth.

Stacy said divided according to Fryman's rough mapping of the area would almost certainly guarantee very few voters ever coming out to cast ballots in an election.

"That's a big problem we're facing," Fryman said.

Another problem addressed by the court was the question of paying half the cost for the purchase of a two-way radio by Nicholas County Jailers Dick and George Carter.

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and explained his vote was a possible protest vote because Coburn said, the jailer did not get a raise in salary although every other county employee's salary was raised.

BLUE LICKS - Bob Johnson, manager of Blue Licks State Park, reported Tuesday that the swimming pool at the park would be closed for repairs following the discovery of several leaks in the walls and floor of the pool.

Johnson said the leaks were discovered shortly after the pool opened Memorial Day. The pool shut down immediately following the discovery and repairs were being brought underway.

So far, repairs have been steadily bringing the pool back up to standard operation, but it will remain closed for a longer period of time.

"I can't put a definite date on when the pool will re-open. We still have a number of repairs and inspections to go. The best suggestion I can make is to call about the Blue Licks office and inquire whether the pool is open yet," Johnson said.

The swimming pool itself is quite old and the damage, though minor, should be attended to with the utmost care to ensure several more years of use, Johnson said.
