Chautauqua performer Joseph Galloway to speak Saturday, July 3

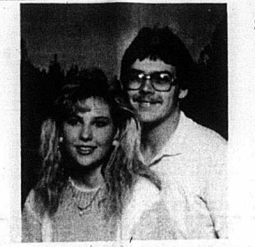
Joseph Galloway was a con man who meant no good, but he did some anyway. In 1783, an extra in television shows Galloway launched a scheme to "steal" some prime broadcast time. Before any harm was done, the swindle was discovered and Galloway was run out of Kentucky. He probably never knew what effect his failed plot had. By demonstrating the need for a state government that could effectively deal with such matters, it helped move Kentucky, then part of Virginia, down the road toward statehood. On Friday, July 3, 1992, at 7 p.m. at Courthouse Square on Main Street in Carlisle, the Kentucky Chautauqua proudly presents David S. DeWitt as Joseph Galloway, Frontier Con Man. In a witty performance, De Witt tells the story of Galloway's plan to convince landowners that Congress was about to declare null and void all land titles in Kentucky. Although Congress was not about to do that, Galloway hoped to take advantage of gullible landowners who might panic and sell out at rock-bottom prices. David S. DeWitt who holds a degree in drama from Centre College, has appeared as Galloway in television shows and feature films. DeWitt is the admissions staff at Georgetown College. His appearance is sponsored locally by Nicholas County Kentucky Bicentennial Committee and by the Kentucky Humanities Council. During the summer of 1992, Kentucky Chautauqua performers will portray fascinating characters from Kentucky history in every county of the Commonwealth. This Kentucky Chautauqua presentation is free and open to the public.
