**CT Scan a new JMHC offering**

Relax. It's just the newest and most technologically advanced addition to the services Johnson Mathers Health Care provides.

It is the Advent HD200. It is a Computer Aided Tomography Scanner, or simply a CAT scanner.

The Advent HD200 is a highly sophisticated diagnostic machine and according to its operator, Robyn Potter, its sophistication is exceeded only by the larger and more daunting MIR machine seen at major urban hospitals, usually carted around in the trailer of an 18-wheel truck.

The CAT scanner is a little easier for nervous patients to deal with, Potter said.

Through the doorway to a CAT scanner, one is immediately faced with a large white circle resembling a large Peppermill lifesaver. One, however, that produces an interesting and revealing kind of spark.

The spark is essentially a low-dose of radiation, a considerably lower dose, Potter said, than an x-ray machine produces. Yet, the images it produces allows physicians to view far more of the internal body than an x-ray machine ever possibly could see said.

The circular shape of the CAT scan allows for a 360-degree view of the body, producing three different, types of images, all of which combine to reveal possible injuries or early detection of disease, Potter said.

The images can even give doctors a look within solid matter, taking readings of activity within the layers of tissue that make up the human



The scanner is, in oversimplified terms, a more sophisticated type of x-ray machine, Potter said. But to merely call it a glorified x-ray is to reduce the range of functions of a CAT scanner.

After a patient is settled on a long bed and brought through the center of the scanner, an image appears on a computer screen. By the manipulation of four different contrast controls, a physician can have a fairly clear view of a body's interior, Potter said.

The images can even give doctors a look within solid matter, taking readings of activity within the layers of tissue that make up the human

8000 persons view queen crowning by state Sen. Ward

 Miss Regina Matton, an eighth generation descendant of David Kennedy who was one of the first to settle in Nicholas County, was crowned Bicentennial Queen on Thursday afternoon at the 44th annual parade Carlisle has ever seen.

State Senator Tom Ward, Yearling, crowned the 18-year-old beauty. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Matton of Bond and was sponsored by the Nicholas County Elementary P.T.A. Ten candidates vied for the honor.

Miss Sharon Elaine Duncan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Duncan, was named runner-up in the queen contest.

Miss Matton will reign through the traditional Bicentennial year of 1976. Approximately 31 units participated in the parade as huge crowds lined the parade route on Main Street to watch. Mayor Bill Power estimated the crowd at over 4,000 persons.

Three floats were honored as best entries. They were Theodora and the Thompson House; Hartsville Methodist Church; and the 44th anniversary depicting Carlisle on a form of a parade float.

David Kennedy moved to the area in 1796, and was listed on the first tax roll of Nicholas county.

Ralph Shearer was chairman of the queen selection, and Harry Cernulias was Jayce chairman for the Parade.
