Continued from Page 1 Of the architects who had interviewed for the job of planning a high school, only Klofoster and Associates, had said vocally that their work until the school was assured of funding, both Hall and Superintendent-Curt Gilbert said. Board members, however, were skeptical that the architectural firm would spend the time drawing up such specific plans and not assume fees for their work. Board attorney Billy Hopkins announced that he had written confirmation from Klofoster that no charge would come until the school received funding. However, board members also agreed that the federal proposal sounded promising. School Superintendent Robert Gilbert said he would try to contact Senator Walter Shephard for specific information about the bill. If it was receiving support in the house and senate, and advice on how Nicholas County might proceed if the bill passed. "It is always the school board's primary function to establish school policy and plan for its future. These plans should be constantly updated."
