Five rural schools in Nicholas county will be discontinued at the end of the term of school, the county board of education announced Monday.

The schools to be discontinued are Miller, Wright, Pleasant Hill, and Pleasant Hill. The schools at Miller will be sent to the Henderson and students at the other schools will be sent to Myers.

The delegates will elect members of the Democratic State Central Executive Committee at these conventions.

Any Democrat registered in this county by March 12, 1992, may seek election as a member of the County Executive Committee and as a delegate to the Congressional District and State Conventions.
