MAY 21, 1936

Wool And Hams Loot Of Thieves

Three bags of wool, containing 47 pounds, were stolen from M. D. Judge some time Saturday night, Mr. Judge reported to Sheriff J. Clark Leav, Jr.

The wool was taken from a barn on the farm of Mr. Judge near Moorfield. One of the bags was torn, and Mr. Judge said he could identify the wool. Dealers in Nicholas and surrounding counties were asked to keep a lookout for the stolen wool.

Oliver Clavel reported to Sheriff Leav that thieves entered the meat house of his home at M. Zion last Thursday and stole nine hams. Mr. Clavel and family were in Carlisle attending commencement exercises of the Carlisle high school, his daughter being a member of the graduating class.

Mr. Clavel said the thieves unlocked his meat house, removed the hams and locked the door again. The theft was discovered until the next day, when most in the building was not taken by the thieves.

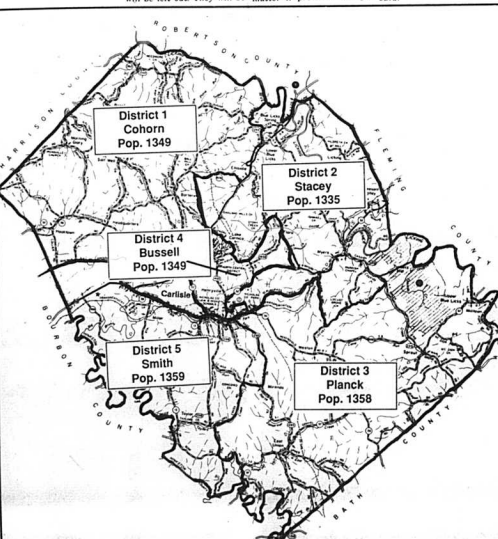

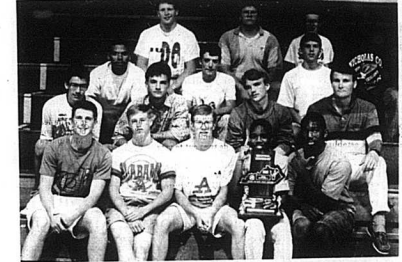
