Continued from page 1 intended to double the existing width of the highway in order to provide a safer, drive and simple passing lane for cars that travel frequently on the road.

However, both alternatives have a particular impact on the local area; neither of which is very desirable, but both seemingly unavoidable, Hicks said.

"One alternative in the works will have a particularly heavy social impact; the other a heavy environmental impact," Hicks said.

"Basically the problem is that U.S. 68 through Nicholas County is lived on one side with several homes and private properties and on the other by a network of creeks that border it. To implement one plan would cut into private property along the existing highway. To facilitate the second alternate plan would involve relocating several water channels that follow along U.S. 68, Hicks said.

"Making matters worse is the fact that several Kentucky historic sites are located along U.S. 68, Hicks said. Which the highway department cannot encroach, Hicks said. What engineers are trying to do is formulate a plan which minimizes both the social and environmental damage, he said.

If "ditch traffic" was the only type traffic the highway department intended to serve, an off route away from the existing road would make making a great deal easier, Hicks said. However, a preliminary meeting of project pre-construction engineers determined that the improvements to 68 will also serve to help people living on the existing route.

Hicks is somewhat optimistic about finally nailing down the two lines for consideration and presentation in a required public hearing to be

announced at a later date.

It is hoped that a public hearing can be scheduled for sometime in the late summer. "Late summer is as specific as we can get right now. Lines are just now coming into focus and we hope to have things solidified soon," Hicks said.
