Jackets fall in season finale 24-20 to Bath

Jones for a gain of one yard on the ground short of the first down at the Nicholas 28 yard line. Third and two turned into third and seven when the Jackets were called for illegal procedure. Adam Con put a sack on Pope to force a fourth and down and 10 with over a minute left in the game and down four points, 24-20. A field goal would not suffice. It was not supposed to be that way. A senior dominated Bath County team preparing to enter the state play off against Leitch was the last place district finisher. Nicholas County, which began its season strong right until after mid-season. Quarterback Shane Kenney turned in an impressive performance at the Jackets helm, carrying through on fakes and passing with strength and authority that was missing when he started the season. Though he completed two of five, one of which was snared by Wes Broedrick for an important 21 yard fourth quarter touchdown, it was clear Kenney was playing with confidence and thought. In one broken pass play, Kenney wisely chose to take the one yard loss rather than risk the interception. The decision paid off when Kenney connected to Broedrick for a 15 yard completion and a first down. There was also Nick Pope, who, with Jerry Watkins, was the Jackets' most consistent assemblers an almost unstoppable running game. However, at the same time as the Jackets underclassmen were making their mark in the 1993 season, fans bid farewell to six seniors, Kevin Jones, Greg Watkins, Mike Caswell, Ed McElhenny, Mark Hammon, and Justin Albene, who formed the nucleus of the Jackets from last year. Unfortunately, it was a 97 yard touchdown run by Andre Jones which showed the Bath County Wildcats to a 24-12 lead early in the fourth quarter. But the game was far from a runaway. Kick offs to Bath County were kept intentionally low and out of the Wildcats runners hands. Although it gave Bath good field position, Head Coach Greg Letcher's decision was sound. On first possession, Bath quickly managed to break across to the Nicholas 40 yard line on a sweep. But once there, the Wildcats were rolled back to the 50 on a holding penalty. Bath County's Andre Jones was nailed for a four yard loss on second down and the pass to Mike May only recovered five yards. Relying solely on the run, Pope took the ball out wide for a 30 yard gain across the 50 to the Bath 45 yard line very quickly. Watkins followed up on two consecutive runs up the middle for 12 yards to the outside the Bath 30. Kevin Watkins burned 15 yards to the Bath 14 and, after an encroachment call, called the live gave the Jackets a first. Kevin stepped in unscathed for the score. But despite the consistent six minute drive, the Jackets missed the extra point field goal attempt to stay at 6-0. Bath County drove to the 28 yard line using Jones almost exclusively for its yardage. The defensive line stopped

grinding into the end zone. Another run gave Bath two to take the lead 8-6. The Jackets came right back at them after a short kick off return to the 30 yard line. Clipping very neatly out the Jackets drive short as a big gain was walked back to a third and 11 situation at the 29. Pope broke out wide left for a 19 yard run and a first down. But the big break came after Pat Baker's punt which rolled out at the five. Jones dropped the handoff and lost two yards on the recovery. But at the three, Jones found a gap ground for the second consecutive Bath County touchdown. At 24-12 the Jackets needed two touchdowns to pass Bath. They had 7:37 to do it. The Jackets mobilized a big drive aided by Jerry Watkins kick off return to the 50. Three plays later, Kenney walked a pass to Broedrick who founded in for the score. Jerry Watkins picked up the first downs only two point conversion was converted by encroachment against Bath and a third and 14 situation was made a first after Bath was called for roughing the passer. Kevin missed 13 yards for another first to the 35 yard line. Pope picked up another first down at the 20. It was clear that if the Jackets could hold on, they would score. But an second down and three in the 15 the Jackets lost coverage by Clark Vice. It was the only Jackets fumble, but an extremely costly one as the half ended by Bath County when a second and 14 facemask penalty punched out a first down, a fourth and four situation was converted by encroachment against Bath and a third and 14 situation was made a first after Bath was called for roughing the passer.
