# Lady Jackets down Morgan 56-45

WEST LIBERTY — A 31-point run by the Morgan County Lady Cougars in the first quarter forced the Nicholas Lady Jackets into playing catch up in the first half of their final pre-season game.

But in a game marked by trade-offs, the Jackets regained the lead on a 12-point run of their own and, technically, won the game by a score of 56-45.

But the scrimmaging game revealed much more than the comback talents of the starting team. It was also a strong indication of the Lady Jacket's bench strength.

"I was encouraged by the way our players stepped in and performed on the court. They weren't just out there to give starters a rest. They also contributed a great deal on offense and especially defense," Head Coach Barbara Kenney said.

After holding back a pre-season assault by North Laurel, the Morgan County Lady Cougars were no less a challenge, bringing to the court a balanced team favored to take a top spot in their region. There were few standout individual efforts as much as a solid team effort displayed by the formidable Lady Cougars. Kenney said. What the Jackets faced was an effective combination of defense and offense which, at times, took the Lady Jackets to task, Kenney said.

"We were much stronger later in the game and I think the team reached a plateau in working together and not trying to force the game which made the difference in the second half," Kenney said.

Defense was a strong factor in the game, but the offense which in the previous scrimmage relied heavily on center Kim Denkins, became more of an all around effort.

Senior Guard Christie Hatten broke from a scoreless effort from the field against Laurel County to a strong shot outside the key. It was her outside jump shot that re-claimed the lead twice for the Lady Jackets in the first half.

At the other guard, Nikki Smoot returned to form with her quickness on defense that garnered three steals and 10 points in the game.

The same combination of height and speed complimented forwards Renee Linville, with four points from the field, one goal coming off a beautifully executed three pass combination from Hatten to Smoot to Linville beneath the basket toward the conclusion of the game. Elizabeth Schandung, along with hitting the team's only three point play of the game, also contributed two steals and two rebounds to round out the starting team effort.

But most of the Jackets' effort came after nine minutes had expired on the clock.

Hatten hit from the key off an assist from Denkins to move ahead, 4-3, in the early going. Smoot snared two from the side at the 10:40 mark for three point Jackets lead.

Three consecutive scores off rebounds by Denkins put the Jackets back within four.

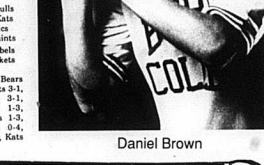
