Our hostess served a delicious salad. The meeting was adjourned.

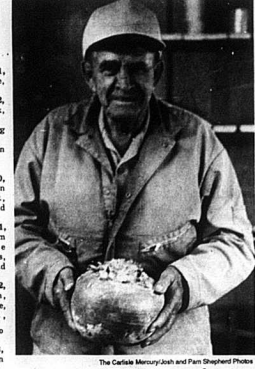
Sunnyvale Homemakers
