But though her athletic interests are considerable, Kayo has a strong desire to become well acquainted with the various aspects of life in her own country, her hobby is American film, history.

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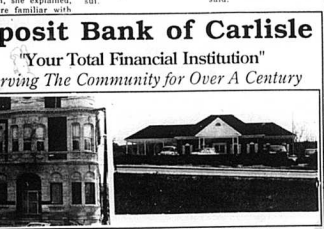
