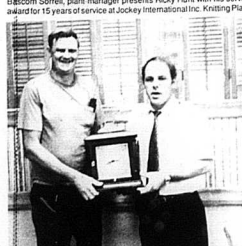
Eddie Hill, manager of Dyeing presents Raymond Anderson with his service award for 25 years of service at Jockey International Inc. Knitting Plant.

Williams director of clearinghouse at MSU

Sharing of expertise and information is the primary objective of Morehead State University's Clearinghouse for School Services, a new arm of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences. The clearinghouse was established to keep up with and coordinate the outreach efforts of MSU faculty members of the region's public schools and to aid in meeting those needs. The clearinghouse will do much to assist MSU in meeting the challenges of the Kentucky Education Reform Act, according to its director Dr. Marium Williams, a veteran public school administrator and teacher who joined MSU's faculty in 1990. "It's really just in its developmental stages right now," said Dr. Williams, a former Nicholas County Elementary School assistant principal who assumed the directorship August 1. One major role for the clearinghouse is to director will be planning in-service workshops for public school teachers and for MSU faculty members with guest speakers who have expertise in special areas related to KERA. "My hope is that the public school systems will see us as providers of in-service programs," said Dr. Williams, who has some definite ideas about in-service. "In-service should not be a single shot item. There must be more than a one-time presentation. We need to follow up and continue sharing information. We need to provide the public school personnel-teachers and administrators-with knowledge, en-

couragement and feedback," she said. The need for quality in-service programs has more than doubled now with the legislature giving schools the opportunity to use up to five instructional days for the additional four days for the in-service programs. "Since most in-service programs for this year are already scheduled, we have the luxury or time to determine from the school systems what particular needs are out there and properly prepare to address those needs," Dr. Williams said. One topic to be addressed, based on a survey of professional coordinators for 17 school districts, deals with implementation of the KERA initiative outcome-based education. Sharing new information among the college's faculty members is another critical mission of the clearinghouse. MSU faculty aware of programs and especially those dealing with KERA's Star Channel and other initiatives. Serving as a liaison between the University of Kentucky Educational Development Corporation's staff development officer and the state Department of Education's Regional Service Center based on MSU's campus is another responsibility for Dr. Williams. Those collaborative efforts will also extend to other state universities under a Council on High Education

ly working cooperatively with other education agencies, we will be more effective in obtaining additional grant monies for special support conferences," she said. For the most part, Dr. Williams sees MSU's Clearinghouse for School Services as a means of maintaining close contacts with school districts, their superintendents and professional coordinators in order to stay alert to their needs and to provide them the necessary expertise. ORDINANCE NO. 10, 1992

AN ORDINANCE SETTING THE PROPERTY VALUATION TAX FOR THE CITY OF CARLISLE AT SIXTY AND SEVEN TENTHS (0.167) CENTS PER ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLAR VALUATION TO BE USED FOR GENERAL FUND PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CARLISLE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I: An ad valorem tax of sixteen and seven tenths (0.167) cents on each one hundred (\$100.00) dollars worth of property is hereby levied on all lands, improvements, and personal property with exception to motor vehicles and watercrafts tangible or intangible, held or owned by any person, firm, company, corporation or association in his, hers, theirs, or it name, or a fiduciary or agency and subject to taxation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION II: Where applicable property values used will be those set by the County Property Valuation Administrator, or by such other authority as the City Council may provide.

SECTION III: All of such taxes shall be paid to the Clerk or Treasurer of the City of Carlisle for General Fund purposes.

SECTION IV: All 1992 taxes paid by October 30, 1992 will be allowed a Two (2) Percent Discount. All 1992 taxes not paid before December 31, 1992 shall be assessed a Six (6) Percent Penalty. In addition, interest at the legal rate and charges for advertising delinquent tax list shall be assessed on all delinquent taxes.

SECTION V: This ordinance shall take effect after it's passage, approval and publication as required by law.
