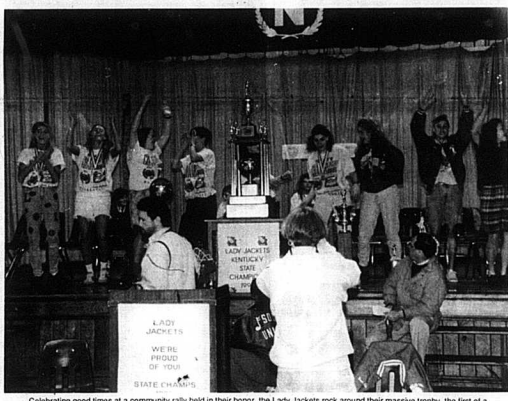

Nicholas Lady Jackets Claim State Hoop Crown We Are The Champions!
Lady Jackets survive last second shot to capture state tournament title game

FRANKFORT — With five seconds remaining in the game, a two-point lead stood between Warren East and Nicholas County for the state championship.
The Lady Jackets' lead of 48-46 remained as the buzzer sounded and, for the first time in history, Nicholas County won the Sweet 16 Championship.
The crowd buzzed and kissed friends and foes alike as their heroines on the hardwood jumped into the air, screams being forced from them by a surge of mixed positive emotions.
The girls landed, falling together in a pile on the floor like 13 lucky chips falling to win Nicholas a \$1 million lottery.
To the fans, the players and Barbara Kenney, who had been waiting for this year for years, winning this game was more valuable than \$1 million, and then some.
"I don't why we have accomplished what we have," Kenney said with tears in her eyes at a championship pep session Sunday.
"I do know we have the greatest young ladies in the state or anywhere on the team this year," Kenney said.
"My mother always told me, Good things come to those who love the Lord," she said, giving credit where she believed it was due.
She said at the rally the girls' determination, desire and love for each other is another reason the girls accomplished the greatest goal for any high-school basketball team in the state of Kentucky.
"No matter what adversity we faced, they always had the courage and the desire. When Christie took that hit to the jaw, Kim Denkins took the rebound and I promise, if any of those Clay County girls got in her way, they would have been laid out on the floor."
"We did it for all of you," she said. The crowd re-

sponded to their reward with loud applause and pride.
The game against Warren East was tough, but just not tough enough to beat the team that had already whipped top-ranked Whitesburg and Clay County in the first round and semifinals respectively.
The game remained pretty close throughout the first and second quarters, but also brought the Warren East Lady Raiders a lot of foul trouble. The team from Bowling Green had six fouls by the end of the first.
The game led off with Warren East taking the ball at tip-off and missing its first shot. Denkins got the rebound and hit the first basket for the Lady Jackets at 7:36 in the first. She scored a second two-pointer at 8:56 after a foul two at 3:23 after Lady

Raider Elrod hit a two-pointer. However, those points were brought back to Nicholas at 1:24 when Nikki Smoot connected twice at the free-throw line after being fouled by Lady Raider Tracy Cole.
At 1:00, Renee Linnville hit a short jumper for two points to bring the Jackets their second six-point lead over Warren East. The Nicholas fans were anticipating a win with their vocal cords straining a premature victory cry.
Warren East scored two more points at the hands of Rhonda Hibbit at the end of the first, which ended with a 14-11 Lady Jackets' lead.
At the start of the second, Warren East sped down the court and stole the ball from Nicholas, but Lady Raider Jamie Britt was blocked by Smoot as Britt tried for a layup.
Denkins rebounded the ball and scored a short jumper at 6:34. The Jackets' lead had shrunk a bit to 16-13, and they were encouraged to work harder by their own determination.
At 8:46, the Jackets' lead narrowed to one point as Lady Raider Miranda Massey took the rebound and scored a hit.
Linnville was fouled at 4:32 and went to the foul line to score one from the line.
Then Denkins brought that shut-back up for the Jackets at 3:20 when she took the Raiders' rebound and made a good, old Denkins hit in the paint. The score was 19-15.
It narrowed to one again, though, to all of Nicholas County's dismay, after Lady Raider
