vention of Louisville at the recent Louisville Science Symposium. Smoot was the same scholarship last year after presenting a science project on mammary carcinoma. It was a continuation of last year's study of cancer of the breast.

"I used different rates of Vitamin D, Vitamin A and a combination of the two on cancer cells in culture plates. I was trying to see if the vitamin compounds would prevent growth of the cells," Smoot said. She was permitted to use a doctor's lab to store her plates, which she treated over a 12-day period. She compared the dishes treated with the vitamin compound with a control dish. Her conclusions proved only a Vitamin A and Vitamin D combination decreased, or prevented, growth of the metastatic cancer cells.

"I found the animals receiving the drug were significantly impaired in ability to learn to spatially navigate to use of environmentally cues, which Hatten prepared for the rats."

"I want to go into science. I'm thinking about medicine. Then, I might just be a biology teacher," she said.

Shandling was entitled "Effect of Vitamin A and Vitamin D on Mammary Carcinoma in Rats." This was the first year Shandling had been to the Northeast Regional Science Fair.
