

Eddie's Restaurant is a happy spot to eat and rest

CARLE — Where can you go in Carle to eat or smile at you?
At Eddie's Family Restaurant at 106 West Main Street, you'll find hundreds of smiles throughout a clown collection on which Briery has based his restaurant's theme.

Since 1970, restaurant owner Eddie Briery has collected more than 2800 clown figurines, paintings, salt and pepper shakers and any other clown items that have come down. His restaurant is decked with many of them.

Even his business card features a clown, smiling underneath the logo "Eddie's Family Restaurant: Where Happy People Meet to Eat and Smile."

"As long as it's a clown, it fascinates me," Briery said. "That fascinates me is the makeup, how someone can put it on and become a different person."

"Briery has had customers from across the country eat at Eddie's, and they all love his clown collection. They have even helped him add to it."

"The people who come in with the carnival during the Blackberry Festival have brought me about 10 to 20 clowns," he said.

"Briery loves the carnival at the circus, he said. He has several poster-size prints publicizing the Oklahoma-based Kelly Miller Brothers Circus. One of the big stars of that troupe was a clown named "Zippo," who Briery remembers well.

"I met him about 10 years ago in Ripley, Ohio," he said. "He's a fisherman by trade with a charter fishing outfit that he runs out of California. I also have his autograph."

Briery lived in Bozo's hometown of Chicago for two years. He had so many clowns when he left there several years ago, that he never's yet been unpacked.

"I have about 10 to 15 boxes that haven't been unpacked since I left Chicago," he said.

Probably one of the clowns in those boxes is a figurine of Emmet Kelly, the world-famous clown. Briery said he owns 400 to 500 objects featuring Kelly, known for his sad smile.

Other famous clowns of which Briery has or has had memorabilia includes Joco and a famous Russian clown whose name Briery could not recall. The piece featuring the Russian was burned in a fire several years ago.

"That clown was brought to me by a senator from Michigan," he said.

Briery's first piece ever collected was given to him by his daughter, Susan. It is a large figurine featuring a red-haired clown in a black costume, and can be found on the glass shelf behind the restaurant's cash register.

"That's my favorite piece," Briery said.

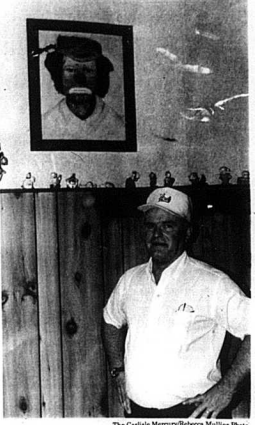
Briery has picked many clowns up on his travels. He ventured to 14 places as far as Japan, Australia and Germany during his 34-year career with the airlines.

He plans to keep on collecting, as long as the clown keep coming to him or he finds one he likes.

"I get 20 for Christmas from people all over the country," he said.

MSU advance registration for fall held April 12-16

Advance registration for Morehead State University's two summer sessions and the fall 1993 semester will be conducted during the week of April 12-16 on the main campus and at MSU's extended campus centers.

On Friday, April 12, advance registration for Big Sandy and Consortium students will be processed from 9 a.m. to noon; however the hours for the Licking Valley and Ashland Area extended campus centers will be 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. that day.

Students currently enrolled and those interested in attending MSU this summer or fall may enroll during this period, according to Gene Harvior, MSU registrar.

Course schedules containing trial schedule blanks will be available from academic departments and extended campus centers on Monday, April 5.

Main campus students will advance register in their major department, beginning with graduate students, seniors and juniors on Monday, April 12. On Tuesday, the registration process will be open to all other students as well. Students without a declared major will register in the Office of General Studies, 223 Alice Young Hall.

Advance registration at the Ashland area, Big Sandy and Licking Valley extended campus centers will be 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. that day.

New students planning to study on the main campus should initiate the admission process in 201 Howell McDowell Administration Building for undergraduate admission or in 701 Ginger Hall for graduate admission. MSU's summer session dates are June 7 to July 2 for Summer 1 and July 12 to August 6 for Summer II. Fall 1993 classes begin August 23.
