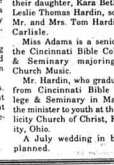

Any action taken by the court will be accurately and fully reported to the public. No one will be humiliated, ignored, or made to feel uncomfortable in any meeting. Anyone who is attempting to serve the best interest of the county will be respected and appreciated for their efforts.
