**Puppets are tools for learning at schools**

**W**ASHINGTON — Some people communicate better in person. Others get their point across in writing or on the phone. Some choose a different mode altogether; puppets.

Puppetry is the focus of art and drama this year at Nicholas County Elementary School where puppeteers Robin Tracy and Lynn Fuller of Centreville, Tennessee's "Wood and String" theatrical company have been working with the school.

The two puppeteers spent much teaching 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th graders how to express themselves through another's image.

Tracy and Fuller spent the day of January 21 helping the children create and perform dialogues for puppet shows.

Nicollie Malloy's 5th and 6th grade gifted and talented class January 21, students were feeding Tracy a "Cinderella" to be taped for a puppet show.

Two of the female students were creating a dialogue for the wicked step sisters which Tracy jotted down into a script.

"I will be the princess, one child said. The other related her own version of the story.

"You can't be the princess."

Another advantage to puppetry, Fuller said, is that it is an inexpensive way to share information. It is also a very effective learning tool.

"In industry, a study was done that showed people who listen receives only 10 percent of information available to them. Visual aids give them 20 percent, but hands-on work gives them 80-90 percent," she said.

Fuller said one needs only to familiarize oneself with puppetry to realize how much influence puppets can have in a child's life.

"Puppets are a very effective means of getting a student's attention," he said.
