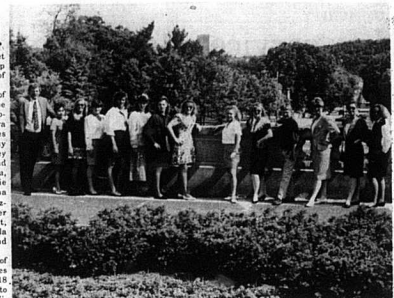
Frankfort. A Nicholas County athletic team was awarded an unprecedented twenty-five points and eight-team rebounds in the title game, and

KCHE elects officers

James M. Miller, Owensboro, was elected to a one-year term as chairman of the Kentucky Council of Higher Education, replacing Joe Bill Campbell of Bowling Green, at the Council's May 17 meeting in Morehead. J. David Porter, Lexington, was elected vice chairman, replacing W. Jerry McFoy, also of Lexington.

Prior to their election these positions of Mr. Miller was chairman of the Council's programs committee and Mr. Porter was chairman of its finance committee.

Mr. Miller replaces Joe Bill Campbell, who served as chairman of the Council since May 1990. Mr. Campbell asked not to be considered for reelection this year, indicating that the chairmanship should be rotated periodically.

Among the major advances made during Mr. Campbell's chairmanship were the development of a new five-year statewide strategic plan for Kentucky's higher education system, a plan for higher education's support of the Kentucky Education Reform Act and implementation of a new program of higher education accountability.

The Council on Higher Education is composed of 17 citizens appointed by the Governor, and the Commissioner of Education as an ex-officio nonvoting member. This board coordinates, oversees and makes plans for Kentucky's system of higher education. Founded in 1934, it is the oldest such state board in the United States.

Established in 1974, KCHE serves all 120 counties in Kentucky. The Frankfort-based association offers its members professional training, insurance policies and other programs tailored to the needs of county governments.

Thirty-two Nicholas County employees have KCHE County employee health and medical insurances. "We went with the KCHE medical plan in 1992," said Michael

Fiscal court saves taxpayers money

Saving local taxpayers money is reason enough for Nicholas County Judge-Executive Reese C. Smoot to stick with his government's current liability insurance program.

"We saved more than \$15,000 our first year with the Kentucky Association of Counties (KAC) by switching its coverage with its private insurer to KAC in 1988.

"In addition to the insurance programs, Nicholas County has also taken advantage of low-interest loans from KAC. "We borrowed \$27,000 last year for solid waste equipment," said Smoot. "It's a five-year loan at 4.68 percent interest. From a bank it would be 8 or 7 percent."

"KAC's liability insurance program has been awfully good to us," said Smoot. "The service they've given us has been great, in terms of money savings and otherwise. We can't save every penny we have."

KAC's liability insurance covers all Nicholas County property, including the road department, day-care center, senior citizens' center and three county parks.
