after her score, giving me to Harrison County.

Boyers took a rebound and made a two-pointer to bring the Jackets closer to Nicholas' 27-13 lead.

Despite Boyers' pressure and that of other Harrison players including Susan Murphy and Whitney Allison, Denkins kept her strength.

In the middle of the first, she shared a kiss with Murphy and Allison right beside her.

The rebound went to Nicholas County, and a long pass to Hutton brought the team a three-pointer. The score at 3:30 in the first was 5-0.

With a little less than two minutes left in the first, Smoot made a steal and passed to Schandling for a layup hit. The Lady Jackets led 13-3 at the end of the first.

A series of free-throws had the team leading 25-4 at the end of the second quarter.

At 6:48 in the first, Hutton printed and drove from the basket to lay one in for two. She had eight points at this point in the game.

She fouled Allison and Filly Noelle Whitaker soon.

Denkins got the ball at :45, and went over Boyers to score two points for a 31-18 lead.

The lead narrowed to 15-13 at 3:05 when GRC's Beck laid in for two.

Following Beck's move, Denkins hit two more; one, a short jumper at the buzzer. The score at the end of the second was 33-22.

Nicholas County didn't lead over the Lady Cardinals by as wide a margin as teams played in the district tournament and the regular season however. The final score of the second game of the semifinals was 42-27.

Head Coach Barbara Kenney said that GRC was a tough team to beat, and emotions didn't run high on the end, but the Lady Jackets kept their cool and did extremely well, especially at the line.

"We stayed with our game plan, Kenney said. "Kim did an excellent job. She had a triple-double" (Kim had 13 points, 11 rebounds and 10 assists) in the point of fouling us to get the ball back to score, we were remarkable. We were 18 for 19 in the fourth quarter."

It was obviously difficult for GRC to lose the game, especially on its home court. "GRC hasn't been beaten on that floor in several years," Kenney said.

"I thought someone was going to get hurt. We knew they would try to slow the ball down. They don't make mistakes."

Tara George, who Kenney complimented on her skill in the game, came into play at 3:14 in the third. She scored two points in the game when she landed by only five points (24-19).

Farm fatalities up for 1992

Thirty-five Kentuckians died in farming accidents last year, a 16 percent increase over the 1991 total of 30 fatalities, according to a statewide farm fatality survey.

Tractor accidents accounted for 25 of the deaths, according to a Glasgow, safety director of Kentucky Farm Bureau who serves as survey coordinator. In all, farm machinery was involved in all but four of the recorded farm fatalities.

Despite last year's increased death toll, Clayton pointed out that 1992 was the second safest year in Kentucky farms in the past decade. During the period 1982-91, an average of 43 deaths have been tabulated annually. The 58 fatalities in 1984 was the decade's worst total while last year's 30 deaths marked the lowest figure.

A trend toward older victims was evident in the 1992 results, Clayton noted. Fourteen of the 35 victims were 65 years of age or older, compared to 11 of that age group the year before.

Showing reduced numbers was the under-25 age class, which dropped from eight fatalities in '91 to two last year.
