Carlisle Christian Easter play arrives next week

CARLISLE - It is the Lenten season, a time for Christians to give up something meaningful to show respect to their Savior.

It is also the time for the Carlisle Christian Church to present its annual Easter Passion Play. Director Kay Channess said the play is an important offering from her church to the Lord each year to remember the crucifixion and resurrection.

"It's a pleasure," Channess said after a dress rehearsal on the play Sunday night. "There are a lot of things in life you work for but what we do for Christ is what is really going to last. Knowing that someone might be reached for Christ makes all the difference."

The musical production is the Nicholas County High School from this year on April 9 and 10 at 7 p.m. Channess said moving the play from the church to the gym will allow more people to enjoy the religious celebration.

The production features two acts which depict the life of Jesus as Christ from his birth and his teachings to his persecution and his death.

Authentic costumes created by church members in addition to special effects and the heavenly sounds of the choir dressed in Israeli costumes from the time of Christ will astound all who attend.

The music in this year's play will be "The Victor" composed by David Clydesdale. A second cast composed by Clydesdale called "The King" will be performed the first half of the play by the choir, and a short intermission will follow.

Both the actors and the choir are equally visible through out the production because narrator Peter Channess, portraying a religious expert who later becomes a Christian, does all the talking on stage, except for a couple of lines spoken by Duane Osborne (Jesus). The actors have no lines.

The play leaves all other verbal explanation of the action in the play to the choir.

Channess introduces all the scenes in the play, occasionally singing songs from "The Victor" and "The King" as well.

Otherwise, the audience perceives the actor's emotions through their body language.

The costumes of the three kings who, according to biblical scripture, travelled from the east to bring the newborn Messiah gifts of love are in an array of red velvets, black and metallic purple satin and gold piping.

The three kings, portrayed by Gordon Sargent, Sammie Vice and Johnny Caswell,

walk up to the nativity scene spread across the stage with their gifts, stopping to kneel beside a pile of hay on which the young carpenter, Joseph (Tommy Crawford) and his baby Jesus (Cameron Crawford) sit, accepting gifts.

Some of the special effects used later in the production to enhance the miracle of the resurrection and the anger of God during the crucifixion include a large black and white light shining around the tomb and Jesus on the cross.

A very titulating moment in the passion play, judged

from the dress rehearsal, is when Osborne stands on the stage, hands outstretched on a cross, and yells, "Father, it is finished!" at the skies toward his heavenly father.

Strobe lights flash like lightning in the sky to display heavenly emotions of anger and sadness.

When Jesus came from his tomb to tell his followers he would be returning for them tomorrow, Osborne is wheeled up to the stage in a flowing white robe. He walks to a throne used to symbolize the throne of Christ in heaven, as

two angels lead him to his heavenly seat.

Channess said the play should be enjoyable to watch because the commitment the actors and choir had to the production.

"They've all been so willing to do a good job," Channess said.

Nicholas County has the Louise Griffin family, the Harry Wolf family and the Shumate family to thank for the many years of employment they have provided. I am extremely pleased to have Johnny and Kentucky Textiles provide employment for our people. I will support them in anyway to improve their market position and provide continued and further employment of our people.

Our farmers, which I am one, have some decisions to make immediately. Tobacco being our primary crop has taken a 10% reduction the past two years, with the health problems and the competition for overseas markets the future doesn't look bright. We still have our farms to maintain and a livelihood to protect therefore we need rally as the team has done to become champions by finding other ways to earn dollars from our farms. This is possible and we are located in a good geographical area to compete and market. I will encourage this to protect our farm income which is so vital to farmers and non-farmers alike.

Our business economy is dependent on our ability to purchase, our attitude about Nicholas County and our ability to attract business outside our county. Our ability to purchase is directly related to our ability to earn. Our attitude probably needs the adjustment and determination we are going to support Nicholas County regards and other good things will follow.

The Lady Jackets have taught us this lesson so well.

I am extremely impressed with the tourism committee. They too have demonstrated progress can be made. They have attracted interest outside the county as well. The Historical Society has accomplished much and there are others. Our appreciation is expressed to you.

For additional employment I think we need small industrial or service type prospects that are suitable to our work force. Expanding our nursing home is an example as there is an immediate need and jobs could be created and additional dollars extended in our county.

I think we probably need to seek a new industrial site which I understand is being done. The present site could be converted to something which would create jobs and income for our community.

I think Nicholas County should be aggressive and expect gradual growth. However, I recognize that everytime we borrow or spend \$6,000 dollars each of us a man, woman, and child has one dollar invested or to pay back with interest. We must be good stewards.
