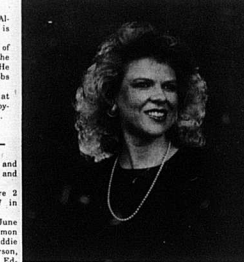
Blair - Mercer announce engagement
