Many times officials do not inform proper officials they are moving and new residents move in and assume use of the water utility. "We usually do not find out about this until we go to disconnect the service," Kinistyle said, "at which time the new residents say they never received a bill. More than likely the bill was addressed to the previous residents and ended up in the trash."

He added, "This is especially a problem at mobile homes, if you know of any customers that are moving, please get them to let us know. If they are already gone, please call John or Rob as soon as possible so billing records may be straightened out."

Kinistyle also said that several customers had written in and complained that their bills are higher this month than they were in previous months and also many were told that readings had been taken for the past three months.

Kinistyle explained first with the "smallest of his summer weather" bills would be higher and if the customer required the meter be re-read and the original reading was found to be correct there would be a \$10 charge provided for in the tariff.

"And the meters are read every month. The only case of a meter being estimated is when a meter is inoperable, for example, a tractor parked

on top of a meter pit," he said. Kinistyle also went over the water board's valid receipt policy.

Cancelled checks with our deposit label on the back are valid receipts as are cash receipts.

"The problem we have is not with people paying their bills with money orders, but with people taking carbon copies of their bills and using them as receipts and saying

they paid their bills. "There is no date on most of them and it would be very easy to buy one money order and pay two bills by using the carbon as a receipt," Kinistyle explained.

Finally, Board Treasurer Judy Hines informed that a disbursement was made in the amount of \$300 to TTI for assessments to go under railroad tracks.

She also informed the board that the closing balance was \$28,276.88

A certification is done by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and the major emphasis of the application is to provide methods for communities to help themselves become better prepared for economic development and provide assistance and resources to aid them in their efforts to capitalize on their strengths and eliminate their weaknesses.

"It is really a self-analysis of the community. The application helps us chart the
