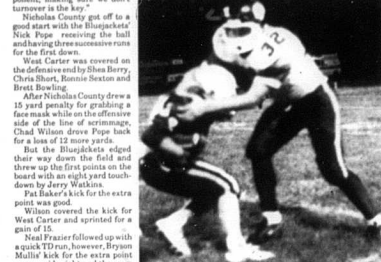
But the Bluejackets edged their way down the field and threw up the first points on the board with an eight yard touchdown by Jerry Watkins.
