NOTICE OF PENDENCY AND PROPOSED DISTRIBUTION OF COAL CONTRAST ESCROW FUNDS

To: All Persons or Entities Who Are Now or Were Electric Customers of Kentucky Utilities Company Between April 1, 1983 and December 31, 1990.

Kentucky Utilities Company ("KUC") has filed with the Public Service Commission of Kentucky ("PSC") a plan for distributing Coal Contrast Escrow Funds to eligible customers with a credit against their bills. These funds are escrowed deposits (including amounts for monthly advance payments) from April 1, 1983 and March 31, 1993. KUC has determined that the Kentucky retail share of the funds is approximately \$12.5 million, net of the Kentucky portion of KUC litigation costs and the cost of interest of this proceeding. KUC proposes to credit this amount, plus interest, by fund closure adjustments to Kentucky bills over a 12 month period.

The PSC will hold hearings on KUC's plan beginning September 28, 1993, at 9:30 a.m., James Doughton, PSC, in the Commission's offices, 700 Schenck Lane, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Under its proposed plan, KUC will distribute the funds to its current retail customers only. Former retail customers, but legal on KUC's system, would not receive a credit to refund. KUC proposes to submit to the PSC, which may order the funds distributed in a manner which differs from KUC's proposed method. Fund action on the application by the PSC may affect the rights of all current and former customers to pursue claims on the fund which differ from the plan approved by the PSC.

Any person, corporation, association, or other entity with an interest in this matter may, by itself or through counsel, request a hearing. The request should be submitted to Public Service Commission of Kentucky, 700 Schenck Lane, P.O. Box 115, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602, and sent forth with the request for the hearing including the name and address of the party. Copies of the Application may be obtained from the Department of Public Service, 100 South Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507. Copies of the Application may be requested at the County Office, 100 South Main Street, Lexington and District Offices in the Kentucky service area.
