Water District gives AQUA 30 day notice

The average cost the other water districts have incurred in one year was approximately \$40,000. These districts have the same amount of customers as we do," Hunter said.

"However, we are paying AQUA/KWS \$81,000 in a one year period for the same services."

Garvey Cartwright said AQUA tent only in breach of their contract, but the water district could not afford the services.

Denkins verbally commits to UK

CARLISLE - Kim Denkins, a senior at Nicholas County High School and a member of the state championship Nicholas County Lady Bluejackets has verbally committed to the University of Kentucky's Lady Wildcat Basketball program.

"I've talked to Coach Fanning and Coach McGlothin and I am very impressed with UK's basketball program as well as their academics," Denkins said.

"I have visited UK's campus several times and gotten acquainted with their staff and some of the players. We just seemed to hit it off really well."

UK has kept an eye on Denkins since she was in eighth grade as have other schools in and around the state of Kentucky.

"I had talked to Tennessee, South Carolina, Virginia, Western and Eastern Kentucky University," Denkins said.

"But I wanted to wait until I was a senior to make the decision. I was most impressed with the way UK really cared about their players—I think I'll really be happy there."

Denkins also said her parents support her decision.

"My parents said they would be happy with whatever school I decided to go with, but they were especially happy this one was so close to home," she said.

Denkins plans to major in Elementary Education and become a teacher.

She will officially sign with the University of Kentucky in November.

Examination class to be held at library

CARLISLE - A self breast examination class, sponsored by the Nicholas County Health Department and the Nicholas County Library, will be held for women of all ages on October 5 from 12 p.m. until 2 p.m.

The program will last approximately 15 minutes and consist of a video presentation and a model for being taught to teach the self examination procedure. Handouts will also be available.

"The most important thing to remember is never to wait until the next month to see if it goes away. She should immediately make an appointment with a physician, and if she does not have a private physician she should make an appointment with the health department," Mulholland said.

"The physician will perform an examination and order a baseline mammogram if necessary."

Local church members volunteer at shelter

MORRHEAD - The Baptist Youth Shelter in Morrhead is a little larger now than it was a few years ago because of the efforts of several Kentucky Baptist churches, including Carlisle's own First Baptist Church.

Reverend Kevin Thomas, Joel Judd, Joe Metcalfe and Tom Metcalfe spent Saturday, September 18, helping to construct an addition to the Kentucky Baptist Homes for Children facility.

"The shelter is a temporary home for young people who have either run away or have been taken out of their homes because of an abuse situation," Thomas said.

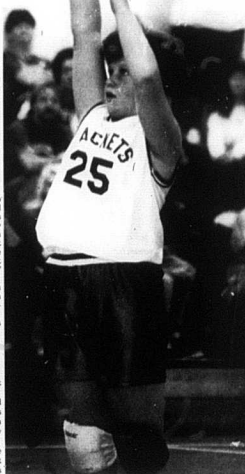
"They may stay there until a more permanent home is found or until they can return to their own home when the situation improves."

The addition brings much needed staff housing and office space to the Home which cares

for boys and girls ages 11 to 17.

"There were 25 other volunteers from various other area churches also there to help with construction," Thomas said.

Dean Harney, director of the shelter, said the 30 volunteers from The First Baptist Church in Carlisle, Morrhead First Baptist Church, Cynthia's First Baptist Church and Calvary Baptist Church in Maysville as well as several other friends of the ministry contributed their construction knowledge and
