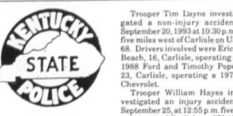

REA to add facilities

WASHINGTON — U.S. Senator Wendell Ford (D-KY) announced today that a rural electric cooperative in northeast Kentucky plans to add facilities to serve 525 new consumers, construct 36 miles of distribution line and make other improvements to its system with a \$2,122,000 direct loan from the rural Electrification Administration (REA).

Senator Ford says the loan to Harrison County Rural Electric Cooperative in Cynthiana, Kentucky, which provides service in Bourbon, Bracken, Grant, Harrison, Nicholas, Pendleton, Robertson, and Scott counties, will be \$500,000 at an annual interest rate of five percent.

The REA, Ford said, is an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The agency has been financing rural electric utilities located throughout the United States and its territories since 1935.

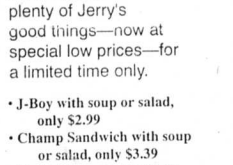
