- Locate cords where they won't create a tripping hazard.
- Connect decorative lights to multi-outlet power strips that contain their own breakers.
- Use only those decorations listed specifically for outdoor use.
- Use ground fault circuit interrupters for added safety.
- Use caution with extension cords that could dry out, heating dust, radiators, the fireplace, or the television.
- Keep the tree stand filled with water and preservative to prevent the tree from drying out.
- If you use an artificial tree, choose one that's fire-resistant.
- Never string electric lights on a metal tree.
- Remember, too, don't use water on an electrical fire. Use plug all holiday decorative lights before leaving the house or before bed. For more electrical safety information, contact the local KU office.

Prearranging and cramming don't work on the farm. The animals must be fed, and the cows must be milked. Other things must be done in season, according to cultural cycles. Natural consequences follow violations, in spite of natural laws and governing principles—the laws of the farm and harvest.

The only thing that endures over time is the law of the farm. According to natural laws and principles, I must prepare the ground, put in the seed, cultivate, we water and sometimes fertilize if I expect to reap a harvest. So also in a marriage, or in helping a teenager through a crisis or a difficult time—there is no instantaneous success formula where you can just move in to get your paycheck up at some positive mental attitude rally before they experience their own success formula.

The law of the harvest: Natural laws, principles, operate regardless. Everyone should get these agriculture principles as the center of their life. As you go, your mind set will change from a scarcity to an abundance regarding their achievement. We must make believers of them.

I once took a coaching job and had a group of 21 games in the five previous years. Those kids won 12 games that year, and a sectional championship. It wasn't a magical formula. It was having a person to believe in them and an abundance of hard work and preparation. One of the players was interviewed before the sectional tournament and asked who was going to win the tournament. He said, "We are." When asked why he thought that, he simply said, "Coach says we can, and we believe him."

The old adage of "If you believe you can achieve," is true, but it is an oversimplification of what must take place. There is an abundance of hard work, dedication and organization and preparation that goes into that success. With every success (promise), there is a price tag that must be met, and you must pay it for your children.

We must see the needs, nurture them so they will grow tall and strong, and we must plant the seeds that will change the world that we live in.

How does this relate to the law of the farm. Simply put, You reap what you sow.

**Ritchie returns from duty**

December 6, 1994 (PTNN)—New Arman Beirut Dennis W. Ritchie, son of Patricia J. Ritchie of 129 Oriole St., Carlisle, KY, recently returned from a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean and Adriatic Seas and Persian Gulf with the aircraft carrier USS George Washington, the lead ship of the USS George Washington Joint Task Group.

Ritchie was one of 5,000 sailors and Marines who completed the 51,000-mile voyage, which included duty off Bosnia-Herzegovina in the Adriatic Sea, and enforcing the "no-fly zone" over southern Iraq. Ritchie traveled twice from the Mediterranean Sea through the Suez Canal and Red Sea, then across the Indian Ocean into the Persian Gulf. Based in Norfolk, VA, USS George Washington deployed with 14 other ships and submarines for the six-month assignment.

Ritchie began the deployment by participating in the 50th anniversary of D-Day with visits to England and France. During the 101st Airborne Division's other government and military officials for an overnight visit as part of the program honoring thousands of World War II veterans. Ritchie's ship spent the last weeks of its deployment there.
