Company to adjust rates

American Cable entertainment will adjust cable television rates in Millersburg and Carlisle's next year. The adjustment will amount to approximately 1.9% for customers who have the Standard Cable Package, the company's most popular package of service. The rate for the Economy Standard level of service will increase by \$2.00 to \$10.25, while the rate for the Satellite TV level of service will be adjusted by \$1.80 to \$7.80. The rate for the Deluxe Service will remain \$2.25. As a result, the Standard Cable Package, which is comprised of all three levels of service, will move from \$20.00 to \$20.44. The new rates will go into effect on January 1, 1995. Since cable television rates are now regulated by the Federal Communications Commission, the company is utilizing the FCC's formula for rate adjustment for the first time. The rates permit cable operators to adjust cable rates on existing contracts by the actual rate of inflation, as determined by the

NC Library wins \$1,000 grant

Nicholas County Public Library has received a \$1,000 book grant from Kentucky Book Fair. This is the 2nd time the library has received a grant. The first award that the Kentucky Book Fair gave in 1984 was received by Nicholas Co. Again in 1989 Nicholas County received \$200.
The Kentucky Book Fair is held each year in Frankfort to raise money by buying the books at 40% discount and then selling them at 20% discount. More than 140 authors displayed their works and signed books. This year to celebrate the 75th anniversary of National Children's Book Week, 15 authors of books for young readers were there. Jorita Anderson stated that the money would be used to purchase new reference material for students who rely on the library for information reports. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
As described in Note A to the financial statements, the organization's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to the financial statements June 30, 1994
NOTE A - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES
The Nicholas County Fire Department financial report covered in this report includes only the checking accounts and certificates of deposit; the property tax collections received in conjunction with a special tax on all property assessed for taxation in the county, and miscellaneous contributions received by the Nicholas County Fire Department.
PRINCIPLES DETERMINING SCOPE OF REPORTING ENTITY
The financial statements of the fund consist only of the funds and account groups for the Fire Department.
BASIS OF ACCOUNTING
Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. Funds are accounted for using the cash basis of accounting; revenues are recognized when they are received. Expenditures are recognized under the cash basis of accounting when the liability is paid.
BUDGET AND BUDGETARY ACCOUNTING
No budget was adopted.

NOTE B - FIXED ASSETS
Fixed assets are recorded as expenditures of the fund. The scope of our audit did not include fixed assets account group for assets purchased in prior years. During the year, the Board purchased equipment and made improvements costing \$2,824.41. These expenses are shown on the statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in the fund balance.
