The teens wanted to know if he was going to re-start a Wednesday night activity in his church called 'Wacky Wednesday,' a youth night that had been popular. The teens told the Lexington Theological Seminary student they needed something to do every night it was the same old thing. They sat on the front wall at the courthouse and talked. He promised that First Christian Church would come up with a plan. The teens were active in an ecumenical program at Morehead State University and had helped operate a Christian office hour during the summers in Hilton Head, S.C. Duke believed a similar program could work in Carlisle, a town of 1,800 people in north central Kentucky. Duke found support from two local school teachers, Roseanne Wood, a member of First Christian Church, and Charley Griffith, a member of First Baptist Church. Together they formed a non-profit corporation called the Nicholas County United Youth Ministry Inc. and began making plans. The project was received gratefully by the citizens of Carlisle and soon the corporation had a Main Street storefront and the support of eight congregations. The ecumenical coalition represented Southern Baptist, Christian, United Methodist, Disciples of Christ, Presbyterian, Assemblies of God, and Roman Catholic churches.
