"STICKS AND STONES..."
"Sticks and stones may break my bones but 'words' will never harm me." Most of us have heard that expression all of our lives. We may even have said that to someone or had someone say it to us. Experience has taught me that this is not true. Sticks and stones may indeed break our bones, but words have a tremendous capacity to hurt very deep. Someone has said, "Never underestimate the power of words." Hitler knew the power of words.

God has given only to human beings the capacity to formulate, use and communicate with words. Animals use their body language (wagging tails, rolling eyes, mimicking gestures) but only humans use words.

White God has entrusted to each of us the awesome power of words. He also demands a strict accountability for the use of these words. Jesus said, "But I tell you that men will have to give account on the day of judgment for every careless word they have spoken. For by your words you will be acquitted, and by your words you will be condemned." (Mt. 12:36-37).

Perhaps everyone could benefit from an evaluation of the words we use. How often do we say, "I love you," "I value your friendship," "You are special," "Thank you," "Even common courtesies are rare these days." How often do we say, "I admire you," "You did a good job," "I'm glad." Even when having to address difficult situations, let us choose our words carefully. In today's society, careless words are more spoken than words that bring life and hope to us.

WORDS OF CHEER... Our world is filled with sadness. People take themselves too seriously. Most of the new is about bad things that happen. Words of cheer are needed. Cheerful words help give a right perspective both to those who give them and to those who receive them. Let us discover the power of words of cheer and use them more generously.

WORDS OF COMFORT... Paul writes, "...comfort them which are in trouble." (2 Cor. 1:3). Violence and death and discouragement are epidemic in our world. Sorrow and lament and discontent are the norm for many people. Words of comfort are needed. Suffering is eased by comforting words. Words of cheer are needed.

Willis, Fryman named to honor roll at Georgetown

Jarrod Ashley Willis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry G. Willis, of Carlisle and Terrie Lee Fryman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen D. Fryman of Carlisle, have been named to the "B" Honor Roll for the 1993 fall semester, announced Dr. Charles N. Boehm, senior vice president of the college.

Students named to the "B" Honor Roll must earn 12 semester hours and have a grade point average of 2.25 or better. Georgetown College, located 12 miles from Lexington in the heart of Bluegrass, is a four-year private liberal arts institution affiliated with the Kentucky Baptist Convention. Since its founding in 1829, Georgetown has produced 34 college and university presidents, five Rhodes Scholars, and numerous state and national leaders in business, education, religion, science and the fine arts. Dr. William H. Crouch Jr. is the 23rd president of the college, which has an enrollment of nearly 1,000 undergraduate and graduate students.

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The Lord comforts us in return. Comfort someone today! WORDS OF COMPASSION... Jesus had great compassion on the sick, suffering and sinful of His day. "When he (Jesus) saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd." (Mt. 9:36). We have only to look around and see the same thing in our world. "Harassed and helpless" is an apt description of many people in our time. Words of compassion are needed. Let us speak them with a caring heart, being sincere and understanding.

WORDS OF LOVE... "And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another..." (Eph. 4:32). Some of the most prevalent words in today's society are words of hatred, strife, envy, and filth. Any newspaper will demonstrate the critical need of our society for words of love. We need these words in our community, our homes, our families, and our churches.

We may not typically think of ourselves as being people of power, but through our use of words, we are. We have the capacity with our words to uplift, or tear down. We can be helpful or destructive. We can cheer or make sad. We can comfort or bring sorrow. We can be sincere or shallow. We can express love or hatred. Remember, "Never underestimate the power of words!" A word freely spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver. (Prov. 25:11).

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
