EKU honors three Nicholas students

Three Nicholas County students are among those honored with Eastern Kentucky University's most prestigious scholarship awards.

The top awards include the E.K.U. Honor Award, Regents Scholarship, Presidential Scholarship and Out-of-State Scholar Award.

Overall, 579 students received one of the top E.K.U. awards—four Honor Awards, seven Out-of-State Scholar Awards, 356 Regents Scholarships and 242 Presidential Awards.

Eastern headquarters attracted high-quality students," said E.K.U. President H. Funderburk, "and the faculty, administration and Board of Regents here have worked hard to increase the number of scholarship awards available to academically talented students who choose to attend E.K.U."

Overall, 579 students received one of the top E.K.U. awards—four Honor Awards, seven Out-of-State Scholar Awards, 356 Regents Scholarships and 242 Presidential Awards.

The E.K.U. Honor Award, valued at \$12,000, recognizes the student who has demonstrated outstanding academic achievement and leadership. Recipients receive a \$3,000 scholarship and a \$9,000 award.

Besides academic achievement and activity fee, recipients receive a \$2,500 award and an ACT composite score of 25.

The Presidential Scholarship is awarded to the top 100 students on a national scale, based on ACT scores and high school class rank and award point average, and ACT scores.

Local students receiving scholarships include Jamie Fry Livingston, receiving the Presidential Scholarship; Robekah R. Crawford and Mary Lawrence, both receiving the Regent Scholarship.

Free hunter education course available

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course will be held on January 29 and 31 from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Nicholas County Library, 100 Catherine Street, Lexington. The course is designed for hunters under 18 years of age. Participants must be accompanied by an adult at least 16 years of age while hunting.

The first session will include actual range time and an examination. Upon successful completion of the course, a graduate card will be issued which is valid in any state where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification.

Effective March 1, 1991, all hunters born on or after January 1, 1975, shall, while hunting, carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate Kentucky hunting license requirements.

RC & D produces video

PARIS — During the December 17 meeting of the Licking River Valley Resource Conservation and Development in Paris, Edgar Darrell, Nicholas County representative, introduced a video that has been prepared by the council entitled, "Improving Fire Protection in Kentucky."

The seven and a half minute video features the Nicholas County Fire Department. A pamphlet of the same subject is near completion and both the video and pamphlet will be distributed statewide.

The video was made at the time of the first dry hydrant in Lake Carrico, Mark Hughes (Nicholas County Fire Chief) has a copy of the video right now, Darrell said.

According to Hughes, who spoke at a Nicholas County Fiscal Court meeting last year on the subject, dry hydrants will not only improve fire protection but will also reduce insurance rates for those residents surrounding the hydrants.

US Congressman Scotty Butler also spoke at the RC&D meeting. His comments focused on the need for development in Kentucky.
