Plan C
Introduced by Senator Chafetz, it is characterized by the following
mandates: all individuals must obtain basic coverage or pay
a penalty equal to local average premiums plus 20 percent;
coverage includes two standard levels of coverage: medical
savings account or a catastrophic plan; employers are not forced
to pay for, but must offer, coverage; small employers have access
to state-established purchasing cooperatives; all plans must
offer standardized benefits; are subject to restrictions on rating and
underwriting practices.
Financing of Plan C includes a "tax cap," individuals or self-
employed could deduct the full cost of the premium up to the
tax; subsidies for low income families would be placed
beginning with permanent residents; coverage would be provided
by reduction in Medicare and Medicaid spending and may be
offset or eliminated depending upon expected savings by

Introduced by Congressman Cooper and otherwise known
as The Managed Competition Act of 1993 is characterized
by reliance on subsidized individual purchase of insurance
within a managed competition. The act would require
National Health Board, each state establishes Health Plan
Purchasing Cooperative, which provides a uniform, compre-
hensible Health Plan; contractor and contracting agency
subject to board approval; individuals join in open enroll-
ment.
Larger firms may form cooperatives while firms
with 500 or fewer people are mandated to participate.
State cooperative; basic costs are fully deductible for in-
dividuals including self-employed. Medicaid is phased out
with cost sharing subsidies for low income families and
federal program for acute care components; states would
gradually assume sole responsibility for Medicaid long-
term care.

Plan E
Introduced by House Minority Leader Michel, it is character-
ized by improvement of availability and affordability of
insurance but does not aim at universal coverage; employers
must offer, but not required to pay for standard package
with substantial cost sharing; a plan could involve medical
savings account, catastrophic coverage with an individual
deductible of \$1,800 in 1994, or a Medisave plan; regula-
tion of underwriting and rating practices in the small group
market; tax changes and pre-emption of state laws encour-
aging development of multiple employer purchasing groups
which are voluntary alliances formed by employers.
The self-employed tax deduction is increased to 100
percent and those people whose employers do not contribute
to their health care plan would also be able to receive a 100
percent deduction of health insurance costs.
States establish Health Allowance Programs and Medic-
ide. The program is a 100 percent subsidy for health
care plans. On the state level, those in 100 percent poverty
are offered to those people 200 percent and below poverty.
Financing involves increased Medicare Part B premiums
for those aged 65 and over, and a federal retirement
age to 62; federal agencies fund retiree health benefits.
