up. I haven't seen a prettier courthouse in the state. I think it's a truly valuable project. I'm all for it!"
New plaster covers a portion of the wall over the staircase, but the hallway leading to the courtroom lobby and rooms on the east and west side of the courthouse are in disarray. Yet windows in all the rooms sport a glorious view of the town and rolling hills beyond.
The ceiling plaster reveals the wooden attic on the east room. The west room floor is covered with plywood because the floor has rotted. Roof leaks are the cause.
Billy Hatfield of Cynthia, who works with juveniles, has asked the Fiscal Court if he could install an office on the third floor. Hatfield has offices at his other

counties, Robertson, Pendleton, and Harrison counties, but no place to put his paperwork here. Hatfield is awaiting permission from the state to have a juvenile office here, the judge said.
Currently, Hatfield talks with juveniles in an area of the Circuit Court office or in the back of the courtroom.
The judge would like to see Hatfield get an office, but the main concern is the roof. "We're gonna have to have a new roof, whether we can get grant money or not," declared the judge.
The rubberized portion of the flat roof is still in good shape and will be for many years to come. It was only done a couple of years ago. It's the rest of the asphalt that needs work and the gutters and secret gutters, especially.

CARLISLE - Want to feed food about helping a child? You can't eat it, but you can save the pull tabs. Put them in a sandwich bag, milk jug or container of choice and save them for children with cancer and leukemia who would like to attend Indian Summer Camp. Jean Bretz of Carlisle collects the pull tabs and once a year she may fill the trunk of her car with pull tab milk jugs that go to recycling center to be sold for market value. The proceeds fund a trip to Indian Summer, located in Eastell County, where the youngsters aged 7-17 can swim, go canoeing, fishing, camping, and get interested in arts and crafts.
"This year I took 60 milk jugs. Bretz said Friday afternoon. The year before that was half that many jugs, so the word is out. It's something anybody can do and it doesn't cost extra money, Bretz said.

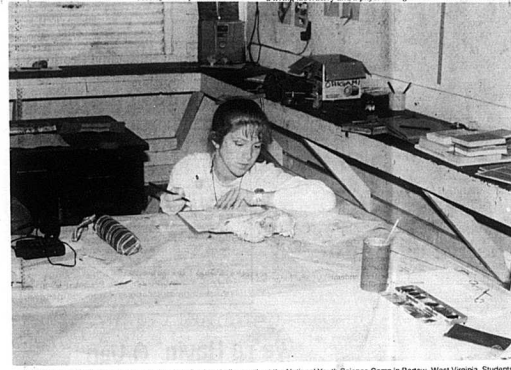

Abnee broadens knowledge at Science Camp

BARTOW, West Virginia. When Amanda Abnee headed for science camp in West Virginia this June, she never expected to find herself conversing with well-known scientists daily. But the 17-year-old Mount Olivet native received about the opportunities available to her as a Kentucky delegate to the National Youth Science Camp. A student at Nicholas County High School, Amanda, daughter of William and Barbara Abnee, is attending the biennial camp in Bartow, West Virginia, where she is enjoying a unique combination of scientific and outdoor education.
Founded in 1963 as part of West Virginia's Centennial Celebration, the National Youth Science Camp was designed to honor the nation's most out-

standing science students and to motivate them to achieve their full potential as scientists and as people. Each year, Columbia who excel in science, leadership, and community involvement. For one month in the mountains of West Virginia, the camp fosters scientific creativity and problem solving skills while stimulating delegates to evaluate their goals and responsibilities.
The cornerstone of the camp program is a series of prominent lecturers who daily visit the camp, sharing expertise on a wide range of topics. Speakers this year include Dr. Robert Godde of Louisiana State University, Dr. David Hackleman of Hawtitt Parkard, Dr. Ellen Mosley-Thompson of the Byrd

Polar Research Center at Ohio State University, and Dr. Michael Spook, a forensic psychiatrist from the University of Maryland. These speakers travel from all parts of the United States to share their knowledge with the 102 young scientists who will soon be making their own marks on the future. Abnee was particularly pleased with the lecturers and lecture series. "I like the fact that you have the chance to interact with the lecturers and time to ask questions."
To supplement the lecture series, the Science Camp staff made up of educators and scientists annually offer hands-on learning opportunities in computer science, natural sciences, physical science, applied arts and music. Educational experiences are restricted to camp boundaries; West Virginia environment provides a living laboratory and a physical challenge for the delegates.
On weekend trips, delegates explore the unusual wilderness areas of Cranberry Glades, Dolly Sods, and Spruce Knob with staff members who specialize in the natural sciences. All have the chance to backpack in the Monongahela National Forest, while a few scale the cliffs of Seneca Rocks, explore subterranean caves, or kayak on the New River.
The camp's location only 200 miles from Washington, D.C. facilitates a three day trip to the nation's capital, where the delegates annually tour the Smithsonian Institution, monuments, and government laboratories. While there, the delegates attend a presentation by Dr. Robert Gallo, pioneer in AIDS research at the National Institute of Health. In honor, they are the guests of honor at a Senate luncheon hosted by West Virginia Senator Robert C. Byrd.
