J. R. Campbell of Carlisle has backpack ready - will travel

CARLISLE - From a simple street to Russia, all J. R. Campbell needs is a backpack and an airplane ticket.

Campbell, 27, a middle-aged man with a mustache and a friendly smile, is one of the few people in Carlisle who have been to Russia. He has traveled there several times in the past few years.

"That's where I want to go next," Campbell said sitting in his den Friday, a world map on the wall and globe on the desk. Piles of neatly organized travel magazines were at the ready.

Campbell's last excursion was with grandson Rob Campbell of Florida. It was 19 days around the world tour from San Francisco, Calif., that included a visit at Alcatraz prison, the old Fort Sumner which was there during the Civil War.

Born on the Sugar Farm in Nicholas County, Campbell graduated from Carlisle High School. His parents owned a grocery store where he worked. Furniture store on Main Street. He has worked both at the Carlisle Mark Mattox Realty, and away.

Since 1972, Campbell has saved his frequent flyer miles and away he goes. "Daily Quire was really good for traveling. By October each year, the kids would be in school and business would drop. I'd take vacation."

The only trips he'd taken up to that point was a trip financed by Uncle Sam in 1944. A portion of the shell that found the mark is still lodged in Campbell's leg. That was his souvenir from Germany. In his effort to be an optimist, Campbell recalled the other soldiers remarking, "You

go to sleep in those white sheets now."

"I've been sleeping in the white sheets," Campbell remembered. His friends correct, Campbell spent four months sleeping in white sheets in the hospital re-

and contains one sixth of all the fresh water in the world. Rob got off the bus and stayed there about a minute," Campbell said. Various places flash in Campbell's mind when he thinks of the most memorable places

throughout the world. Campbell selects his adventures from travel magazines and always flies as cheaply as possible, staying in bed and breakfast establishments when he can. He has seen the pyramids in Cairo, Masai, Myrtle Beach (where Campbell goes two to three times a year), his four day Bahamas trip, his Feb. 1990 trip to Calif. and New Mexico and his stay at the Chihuahua, Mexico, across from El Paso, Texas, at the hotel where John

Delinger last stayed. In March 1990, it was eight days in London, enjoying the sights by coach. (They get mad if you call it a bus.)

Along the way Campbell met a few "characters." The late Josh Davis comes to mind. Campbell met the Australian and found the two had much in common. Davis had also traveled around the world.

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Someone in J. R. Campbell's traveling group snapped the great shot of J. R. and his grandson, Rob Campbell, at St. Petersburg, Russia. The duo took a world tour in May covering part of his wounds.

"No one place can be named a favorite," Campbell insisted. "That's comparing apples and oranges. They all have a unique beauty."

One unique sight on the May trip was the world's largest lake, Lake Baikal in Siberia. "Rob swam in it. It's 250 miles long

and is 3,000 feet deep. It's the only one in the world that never freezes over."
