

Tobacco marketing quota down, price support up

According to officials of the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the \$42.7 million production marketing quota for 1994 is 10 percent less than the 1993 quota. The effective quota could total about 613 million pounds, 106 million less than 1993. The Department of Ag. has increased price support to \$1.714 per pound, an increase of 32 cents.
