Babbage announces contest open to Nicholas students

Bob Babbage, Secretary of State, announced that Nicholas County students have 90 percent to win as much as \$1,000 in prizes and essay contests sponsored by his office. The two contests are open to students grades nine through 12 and are on the topic of "Vote Registration to Vote." The top prize for the slogan contest is \$1,000. Second prize is \$500 and the third prize winner receives \$200. Babbage explained. Winners of the essay contest in each grade will win a \$100 savings bond. Contest information and forms have been mailed to each high school principal. All entries must be postmarked by April 20, 1994 to be eligible. The contest is mandated by a law passed by the 1988 General Assembly. Babbage explained. It is an effort to encourage young people to become more informed and prepared to participate in the democratic process, he added. Melissa McElwain of Portland Christian School in Louisville won the \$1,000 prize in 1993 for her slogan "Vote to Have a Voice, Vote and Have a Voice."

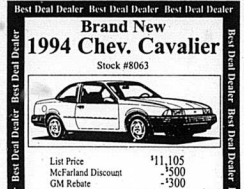
