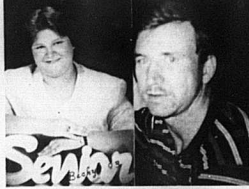

Church Corner

By Rev. Michael J. Weglicki Pastor, Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church Suppose you discovered that you had slipped through a hole in the sleeve. It was your favorite shirt and you didn't want to get rid of it. So you cut the sleeve off and made it into a sleeveless shirt. Once again it is wearable. It has been gifted. The "bad" part was cut off so it was the whole. The same principle can be applied to a piece of fruit, such as an apple. You can cut off the rotten part and eat the rest of it. Even a house plant can be saved and returned to looking attractive by cutting off the dead leaves.

In the Gospel of Mark (Chapter 9, Verses 43-48), Jesus speaks of cutting off your hand, your foot, or tearing out your eye if it is going to lead you to sin. He is really exaggerating; by the use of figures of speech. Jesus wants his audience to know that sin must be cut out of one's life, otherwise he or she risks getting thrown into Gehenna. The word Gehenna means "garbage dump." It was the city dump for the town and located outside the city. Burnable garbage would be incinerated, so there would be a fire that burned constantly. It was a place of disease. Stray animals probably came there looking for food scraps. That gives the description of the place where "the worm dies not and the fire never extinguishes." People who lived in the city could probably see the glowing fire after nightfall. Everyone heard of Gehenna and knew where it was located. Today we could call such a place an environmental disaster. No one would want such a place in their backyard. If anything like that was ever proposed, there would be opposition and outrage. Who would want to spend eternity in a place like that? Sometimes the word "limb" as in an arm or a leg, must be amputated in order to save the entire body. The limb could be cancerous or could have been seriously injured in an accident. Removing any part of the human body is painful. Sometimes a limb can be replaced by an artificial one. A person must then learn to use the new limb. It will also take time to get used to knowing that the human limb is gone forever.

The message is that sin must be removed from one's life. Like any type of surgery, it is going to be painful. A certain sin can become an ingrown habit, so hard to break, because the person is meaning "I'd like to have a pleasurable attachment. In effect, we are cutting off something that is the vine and the branches. If we sin to produce a good crop of grapes, it must be pruned on a regular basis. Likewise one's life should be pruned occasionally to rid oneself of sin and evil. This will allow goodness and virtue to take root. A long-sleeved shirt can be made into a short-sleeved one. The bad part is removed to save the whole. What is sinful can be removed from a person's life in order that they may enter heaven.
