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## Johnson-Mathers says doctors on the way, should return usual hours to hospital staff

CARLISLE - A reduction in the number of patients served this summer has created a temporary reduction in the number of hours some employees of Johnson-Mathers Health Care Inc. are working.  
The hour reductions took effect Monday.  
No registered nurses or licensed practical nurses have had reductions, said JMHIC Administrator Dan Miller on Tuesday. "The patient care areas have not been affected," declared Miller adding, "We hope the actions we've taken are short-term, not long term."  
The adjustment of two new doctors should cause a return to normal regular hours, Miller said.

Free at last as they people realized what was happening and it began to sink in, they began to celebrate. They had been waiting a long time for this to happen.  
We rocked the center of the city by noon on this freedom day before the French people came out by the thousands and we had to stop, not able to move for fear of running over the celebrating people.  
The 2nd French Armored Division came into Paris soon after we arrived from the south.
