Gilbert explains salaries

BARDSTOWN - Former Nicholas County School Superintendent Robert Gilbert has confirmed that the longevity increases for teachers of the Nicholas County district was approved by the board for the 20th and 30th year of service.
Some teachers of the district were unsure of the amount of the longevity increments and when they would be awarded. Several teachers attended the regular September board of education meeting held Monday, Sept. 12 at the Central School Office and asked the board about the increments.
Gilbert, administrative assistant for the Nicholas County Schools in Bardstow, talked to the board on Monday about the salary increase approved by the board.
"The board approve the five percent increase across the board for everybody, classified and certified staff. Then, I wanted to increase longevity to help teachers with retirement and help entice them to stay in the district for 30 years," Gilbert said.
The longevity increments were installed at the 20th and 30th year of service. The increase at the 20th year of service was \$2,000. The increase at the 30th year was \$1,000, Gilbert said. There were no increases indicated from the 20th to 24th year of service.

KSP finds marijuana on Nicholas county farm

CARLISLE - Marijuana plants worth an estimated \$49,000 were found on a Nicholas County farm Wednesday, Sept. 10 by the Kentucky State Police.
Kentucky State Police Troopers Cliff Coates and Shain Stephens and Fish and Wildlife Conservation Officer Herb Booth went to the farm after receiving an anonymous tip, the troopers said.
"We found marijuana plants in the county that looked cultivated. As far as a street value, we got 49 plants worth about \$1,000 a plant," Stephens said.
The plants were six to seven feet tall.
No arrests have been made.
