If someone was to come to you and ask you, "Come, follow me," what would be your reaction? Perhaps you would want to know who this person was, where he came from and why he would want you to follow him. The expected response was to be immediate. There would be no time to think it over and make a response in a week or two. There would even be enough time to say goodbye to your family. You would have to leave your home, workplace and possessions behind forever. What lies ahead would be completely unknown to you.

This is what the apostles were faced with when Jesus called them. He simply said, "Come, follow me." Many of them were fishermen and had no other skills. Matthew was a tax collector. He had to leave his post to become a follower of Jesus. For the twelve that he chose it was a venture into the unknown. Over the period of the next three years He called his apostles gradually reveal to them why He had called them. He called them to be with Him. They were instructed to come into a town and stay at any place which they would be welcome. They could not lack for a place to stay, they could get the best meals they could get. They would share a meal with whoever they would be staying with. They did not even know if their audience would be receptive or hostile to the message. Even before they left on their journey they were promised that it was the one that is doing the calling.

The thoughts of being called and leaving one's home to follow another have been on my mind since receiving the word of a new assignment from my pastor, Rev. Dr. Henry Hanna. He is a graduate of the University of Louisville and the pastor of St. William parish in Lancaster, Kentucky and Sylvester parish in Ottembein, Kentucky.
