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Air, Army National Guard work to raise funds

FRANKFORT, Ky. Kentucky Adjutant General Robert L. Dozarm announced today that the Kentucky National Guard's Easter Seal drive has successfully raised \$118,195.81 for this year's total takes the Kentucky Guard's "Buck Brigade" to \$2,150,871.14 in total contributions since 1972. Volunteers from Army and Air National Guard units across the state operated collection points in their communities during March, April and May to raise money. Over 700 guardsmen and women volunteered to collect in over 43 localities in Kentucky, the top fund-raising units, Detachment 1, 207th Maintenance Company from Walton and 397th Maintenance Company for Central City, were recognized for their efforts in

combining forces to collect \$10,800 for Easter Seal. This year our people went all out in responding to the call of duty for Easter Seal," said Major General Dozarm. "In addition to the familiar roadside collection points, we held basketball and wrestling tournaments, sponsored golf scrambles and dances, and we ran concession stands of all types. Everyone, our officers and enlisted, our soldiers and airmen even our families, got involved, and the result of all this hard work was our highest fund-raising year since 1987."

Major General Dozarm continued, "I am very proud to see the teaming of two such hard-working organizations such as the Kentucky Easter Seal Society and the Kentucky National Guard. We have provided that miracle can indeed be performed, especially when so many dedicated people get together and focus on such a worthy cause." Since 1972, the National Guard has been collecting for Easter Seals through the "Buck Brigade." Of the funds collected for Easter Seal, 99% stay in Kentucky and over 75% go to direct programs and services in Kentucky. 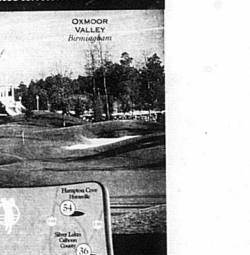
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
