State may help fund county courthouse roof

CARLISLE - Nicholas County Courthouse could get a new roof before winter.

same thing. We work with all 120 counties," Hoffman said. "Magistrate Davy Stone made the motion to accept Hoffman's offer with Magistrate Avery Thurnburg seconding the motion. All magistrates were in favor of applying to Hoffman's offer for the roof fund grant funding. The fiscal court will need to get specs from an architect and send out bids. Bids must be sent to Hoffman. Once the papers are on his office, it could only take a day for the funding to go through," he said.

"We definitely need a roof before winter," commented Judge Smith to the approximately 20 people present. Various figures have been suggested to construct a new

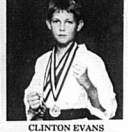

The soon-to-be Nicholas County High School freshmen were selected in the spring to participate in the Belgium Basketball Tournament.

The tournament is open to male and female athletes ages 15-19 and is being held this year Aug. 8-15. Participants will also have a night-swinging tour of Paris, France, Antwerp, Belgium, a historical cultural tour of Brugge and Brussels, Belgium, and a canal cruise in Brugge, Belgium.

Linda Livingood (Jennifer's mother), also praised Todd. "He's very good with the kids." Since the team was announced, many local citizens have contributed financially to make the trip possible. "So many people in this area and outside of Carlisle have contributed. I'd hate not to mention everyone. Both girls will get to go and we're happy about that. It's customary at the tournament to exchange little gifts. Louise Zachary gave us some miniature American flag pins and we got some bubble gum and several other little items to give to the other players," Linda said.

Jennifer, a 5'8" forward, had an special reason for wanting to go. Her grandfather, Irwin Livingood, is a World War II veteran and remembered Belgium when it was turned to rubble.
