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## Council considers curfew

CARLISLE - City Councilwoman Sharon Faulconer returned to council Monday night after a two-month absence. Faulconer was injured in an auto accident on U.S. 68 on June 17. According to the Kentucky State Police, Faulconer wasn't at fault.

During the business part of the meeting, Mayor Clark and council members discussed the pros and cons of having a curfew in town. Juveniles have been reported in town at all hours of the night.

Businesses wanting juveniles off their property at night should post signs stating "No loitering after a specific time. Trespassing would be a violation of state law where the county transportation officer could pick the juveniles up and provide transportation to a detention center. "Carlisle used to have a curfew," Clark told The Mercury. "It was many years back, though, and it didn't work then. We're a small community and what scares me is that so often, you have four good ones and one bad one. They could just be out not bothering anybody."
